

The Principal's Perspective

At the 2010 Graduation Ceremony I asked the graduating students to reflect on all the hard work and dedication they had put into their study at Marcus and reassured them that their investment in education will prove to be a wise decision well into the future.

I outlined to the graduates, a Productivity Commission report in March 2010 identifying that higher levels of education are estimated to be associated with significantly higher wages. Compared to a person with a Year 12 education or less, on average, a person with a diploma qualification earns around 12 per cent more over a life-time. People who hold a bachelor degree qualification or higher, it is estimated, earn wages between 30 and 40 per cent higher than people with otherwise similar characteristics who have not completed Year 12 schooling.

But there are other benefits our graduates will enjoy beyond increased income. An Institute for Higher Education Policy report found that benefits graduates enjoy include higher levels of saving, increased personal/professional mobility, improved quality of life for their children, better consumer decision making, and more hobbies and leisure activities. The Carnegie Foundation found non-monetary benefits of higher education include the tendency for tertiary graduates to become more open-minded, more cultured, more rational and less authoritarian; these benefits are also passed on to succeeding generations.

Therefore, our 2010 year graduates with their tertiary qualification and practical experience in hand are in the box seat – the World is their oyster!

In every state of Australia there have been newspaper reports highlighting low enrolments and predicting the fate of agricultural and equine education institutions. It is evident that most providers, whether they offer degree or vocational courses, are struggling to attract and maintain sustainable student enrolments. I have been asked on many occasions why Marcus Oldham is growing its enrolments and therefore moving against the national trend.

The answer to this question, I believe, is documented in an Australian University Quality Agency audit of Marcus Oldham

which took place in 2010. The audit panel found what we have known for years, that Marcus Oldham has a strong sense of mission and role in Australia, which is widely understood and highly valued both within and outside the College.

The auditors identified that Marcus Oldham is deeply respected and esteemed by a community of passionate advocates. This is demonstrated not only by a generational commitment to the College on the part of board members and Marcus Oldham associates, but also by the camaraderie among staff, students and alumni. Students and graduates interviewed as part of the audit attested that Marcus Oldham College's management, academic and administrative staff are accessible and responsive to student needs and feedback.

The audit panel commended Marcus Oldham for its well qualified teaching staff, and the students interviewed underscored the ability of lecturers to combine practical industry knowledge with theory, while encouraging students to debate and analyse issues.

Marcus Oldham was commended for its consultative, student centred culture that is demonstrated in the active engagement of students within the life of the College. From evidence the panel heard, Marcus Oldham students and graduates question orthodoxies, they are not afraid to express their views, and they use the critical skills gained in the courses to solve workplace problems.

Employers told the auditors that compared with a traditional business graduate, Marcus Oldham graduates can be quickly integrated into a business because of their industry understanding and practical knowledge. The audit panel heard from employers that Marcus Oldham College graduates are more work-ready and productive than graduates from other institutions and for this reason are highly sought. Marcus Oldham graduates are known for their capacity to confidently communicate on many levels. The audit confirmed the integration of curriculum with industry placements is a strong feature of Marcus Oldham courses and is producing work ready graduates that are highly sought after by industry.

These are a number of our points of difference, points of which we are very proud and some of the reasons why Marcus Oldham is the leader in its field.

The development of Marcus Oldham College is very much a team effort. I would like to acknowledge and thank John Miles for his significant contribution to Marcus Oldham over a 31 year period. John retires from the College in April this year.

There have been five Principals of Marcus Oldham over the College's 48 year history, and John has worked alongside four of them. A remarkable achievement! On April 15 a function will be held in The Ivo Dean Centre to acknowledge John's contribution and graduates and partners are welcome to attend. You will see details relating to this function in this edition of MOCOSA.

Finally, I have enjoyed attending several of the major field days during the year and catching up with many graduates, parents and friends of the College. The calendar for 2011 has been finalised and I look forward to meeting many more Marcus supporters during the year.

Jeremy Upton Farm Management 1984 Yarram Park Encourages Students' Development

We have been fortunate enough to employ pre, mid, or post Marcus students for over 20 years now, and they have always been a great source of staff for us. The one trait that has consistently shown very clearly, is the youthful enthusiasm that all the students have brought to us during their time working at 'Yarram Park'. They have mixed well with their peers at work, and there has mostly been a healthy respect gained for each other.

This has always been a very positive factor with all the permanent staff, along with the students having a desire to further their knowledge in all aspects of Agriculture. We all have thoroughly enjoyed this trait that the students bring with them, and because of this, the full time staff enjoy teaching the students and passing on skills as much as they can.

The opportunity to employ these pre, mid, and post Marcus students also creates a healthy mix of youth and experience in the workplace, which is a good blend to move forward with production and performance. Where we are often challenged in the station decision making, the mix allows alternative ideas to be thrown into the pot, which is a good thing.

'Yarram Park' is a mixed grazing and cropping operation comprising 9,360ha at the foot of the Grampians National Park in Victoria's Western District. Running a Prime lamb self-replacing composite flock, stud and commercial Hereford

cattle, and oilseed and cereal cropping, there is always plenty of variety in the day-to-day operations for the students, and the opportunity to learn new skills in general station running.

Many friendships have been formed over the years, and we have mostly followed all of these employees as they move forward with not only their careers, but their personal lives and families. It has been a good thing for us and also, hopefully, for them as well.

Having also been through the Marcus experience and graduating in 1984, I think we all realise as time goes on, what a wonderful opportunity it provides for us in not only our future careers, but life in general. With Marcus focusing on business training and a strong emphasis on financial analysis, graduates come away with the ability to enter an enormous range of career alternatives - not just farming. In our graduating group of 32, there are only seven of us directly involved with running properties, the balance being involved with a huge range of other industries. This creates an extensive network of contacts in many diverse jobs throughout Australia, particularly when you consider the number of course groups going through Marcus nowadays.

The years at Marcus Oldham are really a very high point of our lives, not only with the intensive business training received, but the many life-long friendships that are forged.

Farm Management is a True Profession

I have always looked at my role in management of properties as a true profession and have been very proud of it.

My interest in agriculture started at 14 when spending school holidays working in shearing teams in the mid north of South Australia. I also was given the job of supplying a sheep a day to the shearers' cook. This type of work would very quickly make or break an interest in agriculture. The former occurred and I have maintained my interest ever since.



Jackerooing for two years prior to Marcus Oldham College helped me gain a good understanding of how properties were run and taught me what hard work was all about. Working prior to starting the Marcus course also helps the mind mature slightly, as at that age there are a few priorities on your mind and it wasn't all agriculture. I started the Farm Management course in 1974. It was great fun and a big change from working seven days a week out in the sticks, to enjoying the soft life of a student. This was the only full time course operating at Marcus in those days and it was only for male students. Thankfully, all this has changed with more courses available and female students included.

The course taught me more than the principles of farm management. It provided me with a business framework for decision making and research. The weekly tours to different farm businesses to analyse profitability was a real learning curve. In general, the lecturers were very good and the fact they were required to be involved with real life consulting outside of their lecturing roles, helped keep them in touch with the industry.

After completing the three years at Marcus I went from an overseer's position to my first manager's job at the age of 24. I was determined to always go ahead and up the scale each move I made, and not sideways. A self assessment every five years is a good idea to make sure you are going in the direction you wish.

Management and the organisational challenge of running mixed farming operations was my passion which led me to the management of some very high profile properties. In 1992 I started as Manager of 'The Bulls Run' on the Murrumbidgee River

in NSW. This 8,500 hectare property carried merino sheep, cattle and cropping. A big win for the owner was our realisation the old Murrumbidgee river bed was flowing beneath and through its centre. The water quantity and quality was the best you could find. Consequently my brief was to maximize this resource which led a large development program over 16 years.

It also led to many overseas trips including Japan, Thailand and Canada to market azuki beans. In those times all the irrigation pivot areas had to produce two crops per year to pay for this large investment in irrigation. Our aim, which was achieved, was to receive a return over two and a half years to pay for each irrigation setup. The rotations included seed wheat/azukis, lucerne seed, red clover seed, hay for pharmaceutical purposes, seed wheat/mung beans or soy beans, seed sorghum and seed corn/oaten hay combination. At this stage I completed the Marcus Oldham Bachelor of Business degree externally, which provided me with increased business and marketing skills to manage all these enterprises.

My time spent managing this particular property well exceeded my initial expectations as one needs to think carefully, after 10 years as a manager on any one property, whether you should be moving on and up the ladder. My main reason for staying so long was dealing with an outstanding owner who treated staff in a very professional manner, looked at the property as a business, and kept the challenges coming continually with new development.

In 2007 'The Bulls Run' was sold and I was accepted for the role as General Manager of the Romani Pastoral Company properties. This is a very challenging position involving the actual managing of a 10,000 hectare property near Harden and remaining responsible as a general manager of the other Romani properties. They include large properties near Cootamundra and two holdings totaling 23,000 hectares on the Liverpool Plains near Carroona and Prema. The position requires periodic trips to meet with the managers on these properties and monitoring the strict cash control necessary. This job draws on all the skills in management - including people management, finance/accounting and marketing.

This is an ideal time for me to comment on the life of a farm business manager. Many people do not understand the complexities and skills involved with this profession. Living in one's own home is rarely an option compared to your city counterparts. It can be a very 'tough ask' of your partner to follow you in this profession. Some owners are excellent with staff accommodation, others appalling. It is up to the manager to convince owners of the importance of retaining good staff and their needs. When terminating a staff member who lives on the property it is not only their job that is lost, but the need to change schooling for children and move to a new home and community. This all requires some very good people management to avoid a crisis situation.

Droughts, fires, floods, flies and locusts necessitate the need for a manager in the farming world to be amazingly flexible. Many of these problems are out of the manager's control so

For anyone who ever told Jessica Blackwell that she couldn't make any money in the horse industry, she has proved them wrong! Now armed with a swag of awards, it was her passion, drive and determination that took her to the top.

Since leaving Marcus Oldham in 2005, Jessica's passion has been equine injury rehabilitation and bodywork; however, on arriving at Marcus she was aiming for a career running an equine establishment such as a riding school or agistment centre... but her Marcus education changed all that!

For the required work experience Jessica found her time in equine rehabilitation centres in New Zealand was enjoyable, and chose Equine Sports Therapy for her Special Interest Study Contract at College. Falling in love with the new possibilities in rehabilitating injuries and accelerating performance she moved home to Perth and realised that there was a gap in the market place in Western Australia and especially in Perth as there were no other businesses operating that were providing a full range of rehabilitation services to the equine industry as well as the basics.

So, taking the valuable information learnt at Marcus, she got out in front to fill a niche and set up her own business pioneering a new standard of equine muscle care, which she has done so very successfully.

The business, Equestricare, is quite unique as it offers a complete range of mobile equine sports therapy and rehabilitation services including sports massage, laser therapy, electrotherapy, ultrasound, red light therapy, deep tissue mobilisation and myofascial release. As well as these therapies, Jessica runs educational workshops and has a strong focus on educating her client base and making therapeutic products and equipment accessible to the general horse public.

Starting the business with one client, a cold laser and a car, she has built it up to a thriving business with over 600 clients on the books, including Race Horses, Olympians, Para-Equestrians and National Representatives in the sports of Endurance, Polocrosse, Eventing and Dressage. Jessica now has access to loads of therapeutic equipment and has other therapists working for her.

Being invited to present workshops in other states on "Pony Pilates" and other such topics is always fun and exciting, and a fantastic way for Jessica to get out in the horse industry and inspire others.

Her goal is to set up an Equine Education and Rehabilitation Centre in WA and to franchise Equestricare nationally.

The key lessons Jessica has learnt in developing her own business is that there will always be obstacles in the way and people with little faith in you, but as long as you have focus and clear ideas about your goals and purpose in life you will overcome these

documentation is essential. The need to modify and make relevant changes in enterprises to respond to this changing and dynamic environment is very important. Reporting both financial and physical aspects on a monthly basis should be a strict discipline. When done on time and correctly it creates good communication and records.

Owners of farming businesses need to realise that a high return on capital, excluding capital gain, is hard to achieve on a yearly basis. This can create some problems for a new manager when dealing with a city investor who wishes to achieve unrealistic

obstacles and not let them distract you from what you need to do. If you are doing something you love then anything is possible. And if people start copying you, then you know that it's working!

Jessica said that in order to be successful in the horse industry you need to be innovative and always know where your competitors are at. You also need to love the work and love your clients (the equine ones!!!) People care for their horses more than themselves. If you can show your clients that you care for their horse, and that its health and well-being are of the highest priority to you, then that is the best marketing tool you could ever have.

Jessica's successes include winning the '2010 Telstra Most Innovative Business Women of the Year' and also winning the 'Most Innovative Business Award' and 'Home Based Business Award' in 2009, and the 'Junior Business Person of the Year' and 'New Business of the Year' in 2008 in her local area.

Equestricare is now the most award winning equine business in Australia and Jessica owes it all to the fact that she was never afraid to step out in front and try new things rather than follow in someone else's footsteps.

From Broken Hill to Hong Kong and Beyond



After graduating as part of the 'Angels' Farm Management Group in 1980, I went to Broken Hill to manage 'Mutooroo' and then 'Mulyungarie' Stations. I loved the South Australian pastoral country and the wool industry in particular, and thought my whole working life would be spent running large pastoral properties. After managing a large sheep property in the Riverina and developing our own properties on Kangaroo Island, it finally dawned on me in 1995, that the life of a shepherd was actually leading us into peasantry at an ever increasing pace.

I joined Rabo Bank (then PIBA) as an account manager and two years later went to Adelaide Bank to develop their Rural Banking division. These were both positions I enjoyed immensely. I still wanted to operate on my own balance sheet however, so left corporate life to set up the small consulting firm, AgriPartners. AgriPartners specialises in the sourcing and utilization of debt and equity capital in agribusiness.

Increasingly, AgriPartners' work has focused on the Australian wine industry. Over time, we established two new companies: Adelaide Cellar Door and South Australian Wine Group. Adelaide Cellar Door is a direct to market retail and wholesale business selling wine by the case and is run by my wife, Jane and daughter, Jess. South Australian Wine Group is a wine service company which puts together blends, packaging, logistics, brand concepts

and trades bulk wine of behalf of its suppliers who are mainly larger grape growers.

After much travelling the planet selling wine, we took the plunge and set up Adelaide Cellar Door in Hong Kong, opening an office here in 2006 which was run by Jess who had just finished a commerce degree at Adelaide University. As usual, the venture was more difficult to establish than we thought. By falling backwards into opportunities rather than by great planning and despite all the difficulties, we have actually ended up in the right place at the right time. SA Wine Group's business has also increasingly focused on China. Hong Kong is a great platform for people like us (retired sheep farmers) to target China as a market. To actually live in China without the language skills is just a step too far for us.

By June 2010 Jane and I realised that the potential of the economy here and in China really justified a 'seachange'. We moved here permanently in August. AgriPartners, Adelaide Cellar Door and SA Wine Group are now all based from an office on Johnston Road, Wanchai. Words cannot describe the differences between Wanchai and Broken Hill!

We have always been keen sailors and I wanted a yacht in HK for the weekends. Rather than do things by halves, we purchased a Volvo 60 round-the-world racing yacht and sailed it to Hong Kong from Australia. The adventures in getting it here

are another story as one of the crew died on board on the way. Our son, Angus has come up to HK to skipper the boat. We take locals and tourists out on adventure sailing trips and wine tasting cruises. The boat and Angus' crew have been quite a hit. The sailing here is terrific. Knock-about sailing is new to the Chinese as they tend to see the yachting a luxury thing – there is nothing luxurious about what we do!

Since school and during his time at Marcus Oldham, Angus has worked on cattle stations in Qld and NT, on a pearl farm in the Kimberley and at Boundary Bend in NE Victoria. Coming to Hong Kong was never on the agenda and still wouldn't be if we hadn't dragged him up here, desperate for a skipper!

The place is infectious, the pace of life, the sheer weight of economic activity and the number of smart young people from all over the world almost make Hong Kong a frontier town at the moment. Angus is also working with a New Zealand fellow, the same age, who has built a good business servicing and maintaining large motor yachts for the locals. Yachting services will be a big business in this region. There is certainly the wealth to support it and it is another niche that requires outside experience and flair to service the local market. I doubt Angus will be going home any time soon.

The wine industry in China is a sleeping giant as the growth in wine consumption per head is now unstoppable. In the last four years the Chinese market has gone from nowhere to be the 4th biggest export market for Australian wine. Chinese people are travelling and soaking up new technology and lifestyles and they now have the resources to buy wine. The distribution channels for imported wine are very fragmented and inefficient. To compete with a formidable local industry, Australian wine companies need to embed their business inside the country and not rely on an importer. We now have an office in Shenzhen (just across the border in China from Hong Kong) and I spend a couple of days a week there. Our dry goods are now all sourced from China and we now bottle in China, bringing the wine up in 24,000 litre bladders via Hong Kong.

There has been a lot of doom in the industry which has been spearheaded by grower organisations who specialise in such misery. Despite this, our knowledge of what is going on here has encouraged us to invest very strongly in vineyards in Australia whilst they have been available at giveaway prices.

The world has changed and it is likely to be the turn of the Chinese to dominate global commerce for a while. I strongly recommend past students of the College visit Asia to get an understanding of the region.



The James Darling Resources Centre (Library) – Upgrade and Extension

The Marcus Oldham College Library began as a few shelves of books in one of the classrooms at the College. The collection consisted of several dozen books which were used by students sporadically. In 1980, the College Council recognised the need for a centre which was dedicated wholly to library resources and began a fundraising campaign to aid the costs of building a centre. The architects chosen to design and plan the building decided that the ideal location lay between the student residences and the classrooms. Building works commenced in 1980 and were completed in 1981. The Resources Centre was opened in 1981 by the Honourable Tom Austin and named The James Darling Resources Centre in honour of the man who had been instrumental with the foundation of Marcus Oldham College, Sir James Darling.

Since 1981, the Resources Centre has consistently expanded its collection and has moved into an electronic environment as resources have become more available on-line. The Library holds over six thousand print and electronic items and subscribes to over 150 print and electronic journals. Since 2009, it has undergone a refurbishment to cater for the increasing student

demand and presently has five PC terminals, wireless internet access, a quiet reading area and group working areas.

The development of the College Library has become necessary due to the increased number of students using the Library on a daily basis. They are increasingly finding it more and more difficult to have the space they need to carry out their activities. The Library has become a popular location for students wishing to engage in various activities such as quiet study, group work, recreational reading and relaxing. The current size of the student area will be doubled in the upgrade, providing break-out study rooms, carrels, PC stations, reading areas, larger collections room and an archives room.

The goal to fund this extension and upgrade is \$300,000.

Tasmania's Best Traced from Paddock to Plate

Direct marketing of the products from the fifth generation Archer owned property in Tasmania's Tamar Valley came from the desire to value-add to their farm produce.

The Archer family has farmed Landfall on the eastern bank of the Tamar River since 1876 and for more than a century the family has focused on producing quality farm products, most notably award winning Angus beef and Prime lambs.

Running about 2300 cattle and about 5000 ewes, the main business is breeding Black Angus bulls for the seed stock industry. Ed explained they are the biggest cattle seed stock producer in Tasmania and sell 200 bulls a year Australia wide and hold three annual bull sales. "There's been a lot of years and a lot of money invested in selecting the best genetics for carcass quality. We felt Landfall Farm Fresh was one way of capitalising on our investments over the years."

Following the example of their hardworking parents, Gerald and Lou, Ed Archer and his four siblings, Will, Frank, Ellie and Mimi were keen to be involved in the family farm but needed to develop more enterprises for the business to support them. Established in 2008 Landfall Farm Fresh is a relatively new business venture the Archer siblings (partnering directors) independently created. It provides 100% grass fed beef and Prime lamb to consumers, who in turn, are able to track the products' journey from beginning to end. "People really appreciate knowing where their lamb and beef comes from," said Ellie.

An independent entity from the farm, the retail business emerged from developing a succession plan. Landfall Farm Fresh initially worked from a small facility and sold product at a local farmers' market in Launceston.

Within the first twelve months the demand soon outweighed their ability to supply and the business naturally expanded.

Managed by Ellie, the boutique butcher shop opened its doors in December 2009 in Balfour Street, Launceston. Positive consumer response has clearly demonstrated satisfaction with the opportunity to purchase high quality products. The meat is grown at Landfall in a humane, free-ranging grazing environment within a strict quality-assured program. The industry's Cattle Care Quality Assurance program is to assure the product is free of contaminant, and also deals with the handling of the stock to make sure it's done in a humane and friendly way.

The Archers have full control of the supply chain. "We can back ourselves and our product with total confidence," Frank says. "Breeding the animals, growing them, processing, packaging and marketing is all done by us. We contract out the slaughtering. At the shop an experienced butcher is employed to process the Landfall beef and lamb and prepare it for sale. A variety of gluten and preservative free traditional and gourmet sausages

Landfall Farm Fresh is a member of the Australian Meat Industry Council (AMIC) which is the peak body that represents retailers, processors, exporters and smallgoods manufacturers in the post-farm-gate meat industry. Staff development has covered end-user training with Meat Standards Australia (MSA), in order to stock and sell MSA beef, and attendance at the Meat Livestock Australia/MSA hands on workshop to develop butchering skills and new techniques.

Understanding the needs of the consumer is fundamental and the Archers are continually doing market research. They are also aware of community activity and get involved in food and wine events, supporting school, sporting club and fundraising organisations and donate to a local food kitchen and crisis housing.

They overcame a myriad of barriers and difficulties facing a small business by treating them as a challenge. Such issues included the venture into retailing, staff recruitment, working with family and competing priorities. Essential was a business plan and organisation structure with delineation of roles and responsibilities. Regular director meetings are vital and weekly operational meetings assist with team building, open communication and employee ownership.

Agricultural Revolution (England)

The Agricultural Revolution (modern) refers to the drastic changes in the farming process that occurred in the 1600's onwards.

The spread-out, shared farms, common under the "open-field system" of cultivation, turned into more compact, but larger, farms. The many problems associated with open fields: the overgrazing of animals, difficulty in reaching consensus for change, and single herds that had led to a spread of animal diseases and uncontrollable breeding, had all become generally solved.

Farmers discovered a crop rotation system that allowed them to forgo leaving up to half the land unused or fallow between each planting. Animal husbandry became widely used. This was just the beginning of the change.

The agricultural output of England increased about three and a half times. With more productive farms and a smaller work load, more people left the farms to go to the city, and this large available workforce allowed for the greater production needed to spark the Industrial Revolution.

From the Horse's Mouth



From a very early age I knew I wanted to work in the equine industry – but in what field? There are so many areas of the equine industry. At a Tooradin pony club rally I watched a very interesting equine dentistry demonstration and decided that is what I want to be! So, by the age of 15, I had found the job that I wanted to do.

There are a few equine dentistry courses available but only one Nationally Accredited - the Equine Dental Association of Australia (EDAA) and I believe this is the best course. It is hard to get accepted as only two or three students are taken each year and are selected on horse experience and the ability to run their own business and make a full time living out of equine dentistry.

Finishing school in 2004 I applied for the dentistry course but I was only just 18, and although I had horse experience it was not much compared to the other applicants. I was advised to get more experience and try again.

Working at a big cattle station in Mackay Qld I drove cattle and took part in branding and vaccinating calves and cows. Returning to Victoria, leading jumps trainer, Eric Musgrove, employed me. Eric was on the brink of leaving for Japan with 'Karasi', to participate for the first time in the richest jumps race in the world - the Nakayama Grand Jump. He needed an extra worker while he was away so I was now a strapper and track work rider.

Eric came back six weeks later with his first Nakayama Grand Jump trophy and asked me to keep working for him, which I did as it was enjoyable and I was over the hardest bit (developing muscles I never thought I had). I rode up to 15 horses five kilometres a day each, and with 30 of those kilometres in trot, (equivalent to gym squats) I was fit!

When EDAA enrolment time came again I put in my resume and was invited to the field days this time, where you go out with three of the five committee members for a day so they can ask questions and see how you handle a horse. I was told I was a little young and need more experience, but I was welcome to have an interview to see what it is like. I'd never been interviewed before, and as it turns out, I am not so good at interviews. I went blank and answered yes, no or maybe, to what should be long detailed answers. I did not get in, but I had my foot in the door and they knew who I was, even if it is the yes, no or maybe girl!

At this time I purchased the Weekly Times and saw Marcus Oldham advertising the Equine Sports Scholarship. I had heard very good things about Marcus and applied for the scholarship. At the interview I did the same thing ... blank. But the College rang Eric and he must have put in a good word for me as I received the scholarship to start the next year.

So off I went, very excited at making new friends who were just as obsessed with horses as me and I was having the best year of my life learning new and fantastic things.

The Principal gave permission for me to accompany Eric Musgrove to Japan with 'Karasi' to compete in the Nakayama Grand Jump. Forty-five hours in the air and eight hours a day working, feeding and riding the horse, proved to be worth it as the 11yo, 'Karasi' cruised over the 17 jumps in the 4250m race to win for the second time in a row. It was a fantastic thrill; as was the opportunity to see another country's equine industry and culture.

After my incredible year at Marcus I applied for EDAA course again with a few more things on my resume. I managed the field days and interview thanks to the hard work and lots of practice with Marcus Oldham lecturers and classmates, but once again was

out-shone by the other applicants, but still undeterred after the third rejection.

I was having riding lesson with Adam Wootten who offered me a job working in his stables with show jumpers and decided this would give me more experience in another field in which I was very interested and competed in. It could also help with my dentistry career path, so off I went, working showjumping horses and going to a lot of shows.

Once again it was application time for equine dentistry. Field days and interviews were becoming a regular part of my year, like Easter and Christmas, but this time I received the very exciting phone call - I'd been accepted. Whether they were sick of me after my record breaking four years in a row or it was well deserved, didn't matter. I was just so happy to have achieved my goal of seven years.

Starting in early 2008, the 15 month course included 230 days on the field and six weeks in the class room. During my training I did the teeth of Bart Cummings' horse 'Viewed' just before he won the Melbourne Cup, which was a bit of a thrill.

I started my own Equine Dental business in May 2009. Work doesn't feel like a job if you like what you are doing, and I like doing horses' teeth and helping horses. I enjoy driving to new areas and meeting people. The contacts I made through Marcus Oldham have proved to be very valuable in finding work, as I am now providing a service for a number of College class mates

including race horse trainer **Rebecca Gribble HBM 2006**, and **Katrina Wood HBM 2006** who has Merton Creek Thoroughbreds breeding and agistment property.

I especially appreciate the support from my family, friends, Eric Musgrove and Marcus Oldham College for providing me with the knowledge and experience that allows me to have my dream job and run it effectively.


